Thurmond FFA Team Takes Top Honors in State Envirothon

The Strom Thurmond Technology Center FFA Team took first-place honors at the ninth annual South Carolina Environthon, held at Clemson University's Sandhill Research and Education Center near Columbia, S.C., on Friday, May 6.

Team members Russell Henderson, Bettis Rainsford, Aaron Ingle, Richard Miller and Drew Cheatham were each presented a medallion and a \$500 college scholarship. Team coach Hugh Bland, agricultural education teacher and FFA Advisor at the center, received a \$500 cash award.

In addition to the scholarships, team members and their advisor were awarded an all-expenses-paid trip to represent South Carolina in the International Cannon-sponsored Envirothon, scheduled for July 18-24 at Southwest Missouri State University in Springfield, Mo.

The Thurmond FFA Team also placed first in the SC FFA Division of the Envirothon. The Calhoun Falls FFA Team placed second, and the Laurens FFA Team placed third.

The Calhoun Falls Team will represent the SC FFA at the National FFA Convention in October and will compete in the Natural Resource and Environmental Science Career Development Event Finals.

The major categories of the Envirothon competition were aquatics, cultural landscapes, forestry, soils, wildlife and oral presentation.

The State Envirothon is coordinated by a committee of representatives from the SC Department of Natural Resources, the SC Association of Conservation Districts, the Department of Health and Environmental Control, the SC Department of Education, the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service, the SC Commission of Forestry and Clemson University's Cooperative Extension Service.

National FFA President Brian H. Hogue of Wilcox, Ariz., toured South Carolina April 19-22, 2005 and visited FFA chapters, agricultural businesses, government officials and a golf course.

He arrived in Columbia, S.C., on April 19 and traveled with Keith Cox, State FFA Executive Secretary, to Belton-Honea Path High School, where he conducted a leadership training session for FFA officers from a number of Upstate schools.

On Wednesday, April 20, Hogue, who was joined in Columbia by some State FFA Officers, received a royal welcome to the S.C. General Assembly from Representative Ronnie Townsend, chairman of the House Education Committee; Representative Billy Witherspoon, chairman of the House Agriculture and Natural Resources Committee; Representative Marty Coates, a former National FFA Officer; and State Senator Larry Grooms, chairman of the Senate Agricultural Committee. He was introduced to the House and Senate while they were in session.

A dignitaries' luncheon was held in Hogue's honor at the Capital City Club in Columbia, with a number of South Carolina's leading governmental and agricultural officials in attendance. He was interviewed on the State Radio Network while in Columbia.

He visited Pelion High School's agricultural education department and toured the Walter P. Rawl and Sons Vegetable Processing Plant. He led a second leadership training session for mid-state FFA chapter officers hosted by the Lexington Technology Center FFA Chapter.

On Thursday, April 21, Hogue toured a Sumter County farm owned and operated by Ricky McDaniel, president of the SC Young Farmer-Agribusiness Association, followed by a golf game at the Sumter National Golf Course. He conducted a third leadership training session for Pee Dee-area FFA chapter officers hosted by the Manning High School FFA Chapter.

On Friday, April 22, the National FFA Vice President visited Loris High School's agricultural education department, followed by a tour of Graham Brothers Tobacco Warehouse, Tyler Tobacco Farm and the SC FFA Center at Cherry Grove.

South Carolina's Peach Crop Looking Great

South Carolina's peach season is under way. The quality and flavor of the fruit is very good this year, according to Julie Huffman with the S.C. Peach Council. The season is running about 10 days to two weeks later than usual due to cooler weather in the spring, but there are plenty of peaches available throughout the summer.

South Carolina peaches are tastier because Mother Nature works hand in hand with the growers. Under careful observation, peaches are allowed to ripen naturally on the tree. Combined with hot days, humid nights and slightly acidic soils, South Carolina growers produce the sweetest, juiciest and best-tasting peaches on the market.

In terms of production, South Carolina is the number-one peach state east of the Mississippi River and second in the nation behind California.



Governor Proclaims July as Peach Month

Governor Mark Sanford has proclaimed July as Peach Month in South Carolina in recognition of the importance of the peach industry to the overall economy.

Peach production, a segment of South Carolina's second-largest industry — agriculture — grosses \$40 million annually, and this figure does not reflect the approximately \$30 million spent by the peach industry in related industries such as trucking, equipment maintenance, paper products and marketing.

USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service Celebrates 70 Years

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) is celebrating 70 years of changing the face of South Carolina, from one scarred by erosion and severe flooding to fertile and productive fields and clean, clear streams.

NRCS was created as the Soil Conservation Service (SCS) within the USDA on April 7, 1935 in response to the natural devastation across the American landscape that became known as the Dust Bowl days. The primary mission of the agency then was to conserve soil on agricultural land. The SCS became the NRCS in 1994 to better reflect its expanded role of protecting other natural resources such as water, air, plants and animals on all private and tribal lands.

South Carolina NRCS State Conservationist Walter W. Douglas, an FFA alumnus, explained that the anniversary theme, "A Partner in Conservation Since 1935," reflects the agency's mission to provide leadership in a partnership effort to assist private land owners and managers conserve, maintain and improve natural resources and the environment.

NRCS employees work in partnership with the South Carolina Department of Natural Resources and Conservation Districts, serving all 46 counties through 39 USDA Service Centers. Individuals and communities receive one-on-one technical assistance from a multidisciplinary staff, including soil scientists, engineers, biologists, agronomists and others who work together to ensure the land user receives the latest science-based technology and up-to-date natural resource information available. The agency provides financial assistance to land users to assist in implementing a number of conservation practices. Participation in all NRCS programs is voluntary.

Nation's First Conservation Plan Developed in South Carolina

The plan was developed in concert with the Upper Savannah Soil and Water Conservation District (Anderson, Oconee and Pickens counties). A primary purpose of the conservation district was to promote the acceptance of conservation technology by farmers. This partnership between the USDA SCS (now NRCS) and conservation districts was successful from the beginning and resulted in a restoration miracle on millions of acres of land in South Carolina. Today, each county is a legally constituted Soil and Water Conservation District with expanded responsibilities beyond conservation of agricultural land.

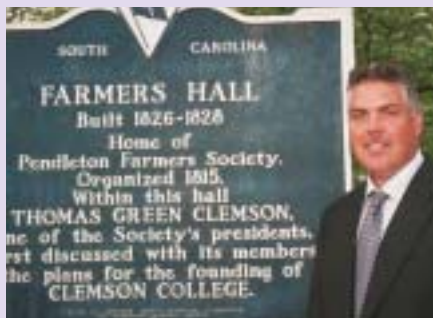
Starling was fifth in ticket sales in the nation this year, and the Myrtle Beach FFA Chapter placed 12th in the national program.

The Pendleton Farmers Society, organized in 1815, meets in the Farmers Hall, which was constructed in 1828 on the square in Pendleton. It is the oldest farmers' hall in continuous use in the nation.

It was here that Thomas Green Clemson, a former president of the society, first discussed plans for founding a land grant institution that became a reality and today is Clemson University.

Thurmond FFA Agronomy Team Takes Top Honors



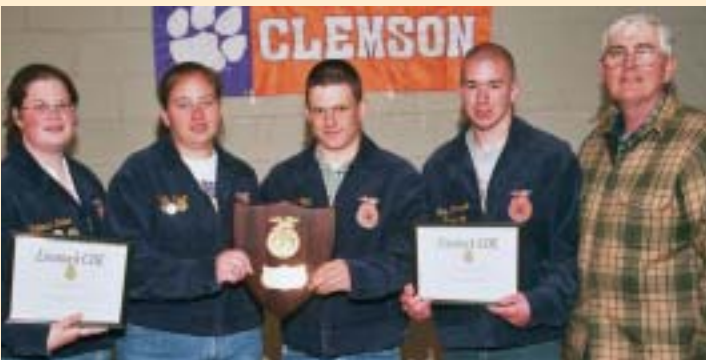

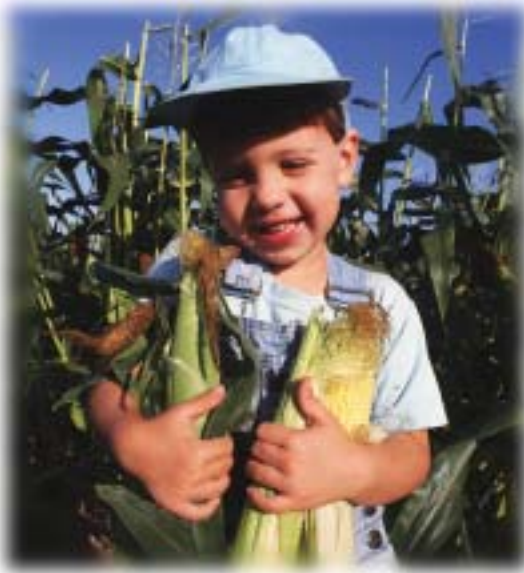

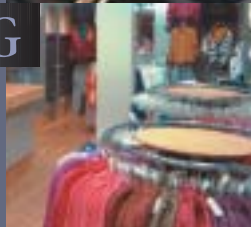
